Sister Paulette Deters, CSJ

Class of 1960



When St. Martin's was ready to open its doors in 1951, I was ready. My father was also ready and made sure that I was the first student registered for the new school. I was in the first kindergarten class, taught by Mrs. Sable, and continued all the way through eighth grade, graduating in 1960. Under the guidance of the School Sisters of Notre Dame, we were educated and prepared for the sacraments: "confession," "communion," and confirmation. During our fifth grade, when all kids from grades 5 – 8 were confirmed, the old church was so packed that not even all the sponsors could attend; there was no room for parents.

Besides learning the 4 R's (reading, 'riting, 'rithmetic, and religion), I spent extra time helping the teachers after school, playing on school teams, and singing in the school choir. Under Sr. Frances Marie's direction, many choir practices after school and on Saturdays were spent learning Latin chants for Sunday "high masses" or funerals. Living down the hill from the school, we were sometimes recruited to help clean the church for special occasions.

Like most kids, I loved recess. In the lower grades, tetherball and dodge ball were my favorites, especially when I could beat the boys; in the upper grades, I focused on volleyball and volley tennis. Every day I would run home for lunch, and then hurry back to play sports.

What are some of my favorite memories? Folk dancing in 3rd grade and participating in the school dance festival; daily school masses followed by breakfast in the classroom; the yearly May Crowning and Living Rosary in the church; 5th grade art classes in the lower field/pasture; Girl Scout activities; and most math classes. I enjoyed school.

After graduation, I attended Rosary High School in San Diego, and later joined the Sisters of St. Joseph of Orange and focused on religious life. I received my BA in English from Loyola-Marymount University and MA in Private School Administration from University of San Francisco. For 40+ years I taught grades 3-8 in various parish schools, mostly in Orange Co. (From 1987-89, I taught at Our Lady of the Sacred Heart School, now housed in my former high school building). In 2011, after retiring from teaching and grading papers, I began working in my Community's Finance Office in Orange. Presently I am involved in banking, supporting the finance staff, completing extra jobs, and over-seeing maintenance at our beach houses. The multi-tasking and Interaction with adults keeps me plenty busy.

Music has been an important part of my life. Every year since grade school, I have belonged to some type of choir or chorus— school, church, Community, and/or professional. This is my 46th year of singing with OC's professional chorus, the Pacific Chorale; Holy Family Cathedral Choir has been my church choir since the early '90's. Practicing at least two nights a week (plus extra concert rehearsals) doesn't allow for much free time. The schedule can get stressful, yet music nourishes the inner spirit. Belonging to both groups has allowed me to sing with wonderful symphonies, travel to Europe, visit beautiful sites, and enjoy the richness of other cultures.



The Deters Family has been a part of St. Martin Parish even before Fr. Barry's arrival. My grandfather helped paint the old rectory. My dad belonged to the Knights of Columbus and my mom joined the Women's Club. She and my brother Lee were long-time members of the church choir. Both brothers, Lee and Norman, were active in the Boy Scouts and attended Saints. My sisters Shirley, Margie and Anna (SMA class of '60) all went to OLSH and Rosary, and were married at the parish. I was the youngest of six children born to Ray and Viola Deters. As long as I can remember, St. Martin's has always been an important part of our lives.

Since 1964, my larger family has been the Sisters of St. Joseph of Orange, a community of religious women (now about 140 sisters) who have served in education and health care ever since the Community was founded in 1912. We are dedicated to serving the "dear neighbor" by promoting unity and reconciliation among all people. In July 2014, I celebrated 50 years as a Sister of St. Joseph.



Thank you, St. Martin's, for providing a solid background in academics and the Catholic faith; for letting us just hang out and feel at home; for nurturing my love for music, my interest in teaching, and my call to religious life; for connecting us with so many wonderful families. St. Martin's will always hold a special place in my heart.


Class of 1985 - Reunion




Howard Dye Class of 1955





I look forward to where my career goes next and hope to one day be an Editor in Chief of a local newspaper or magazine.

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
Rebecca Ortega Class of 2004
